Pascha: Christ's Rescue Mission

PRIEST, A MINISTER, AND A RABBI went to a funeral home. This sounds like the beginning of a bad joke. Actually, a few weeks ago, I participated in a forum on how different religious faiths respond to issues of dying and death. One of our sessions was actually at a funeral home. We—the priest, the minister, and the rabbi—shared our agreement on certain issues and themes and we respectfully noted our differences. The participants came from a variety of religious and non-religious backgrounds.

Our common issue, one that confronts everyone who comes into the world, is the origin of death. Certainly

the clergy agreed that death was not God's plan for His Creation: Death resulted instead when our first parents disobeyed God. Adam and Eve chose to live on earth according to their own standards and so, they forfeited the hope of immortality that comes only through obedience to Him.

I can't tell how many attendees really grasped the fact that death was not of God. We didn't poll them and it wasn't our purpose to convince them. Yet, to understand that death is not part of the created order is essential to understand the whole mission of Christ: His Incarnation and ministry, His passion, death and burial, and above all, His glorious Resurrection from the dead.

On the Resurrection of Christ (continued from page 1)

If Christ's mission was not a rescue mission, if death were a part of the natural order, then it would seem that God is merely playing games with man. In other words, if death were God's intent from the start, it would make God unjust: creating man to die in the first place, only to tempt him with the offer of immortality.

Man was created for eternity but chose the temporal. He was made for Paradise but chose death on his own. And God, who is not only just but merciful, became one of us, to rescue us and give us eternal life through the Incarnation, death and Resurrection of his own Son. It is on this point that religions differ. The priest and the minister might still be in concert, but the rabbi would diverge here.

Everyone on the face of the planet ultimately must come to terms with this divergence: who Christ is and why he has come into the world. One way or another, one decides. Either God is just and merciful, or he is not. Either, man has been created for a purpose or life is without meaning. Either Christ is risen, or our faith is vain (cf. I Cor. 15:14).

The Resurrection of Christ is God's ultimate sign of justice and assurance of mercy. It is the stamp of his character on the whole creation. Already that creation longs for and groans for the redemption of our bodies. Already we yearn for our resurrection through Christ (cf. Rom. 8:22-23). That is truly why we are longing for Pascha, now: to shout with every fiber of our being:

Christ is risen! Truly, He is risen! ■

Christ, Church, Husband, and Wife

"For the husband is the head of the wife, as also Christ is head of the Church; and He is the Savior of the body. Therefore just as the Church is subject to Christ, so let the wives be to their own husbands in everything. Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ loved the Church and gave Himself for it"

— EPHESIANS 5:23

Some brides-to-be resent this epistle read at every Orthodox Church wedding. They think it's sexist... in this era of liberation of women. But that objection is misdirected. This advice of St. Paul is not about subordination of woman to man, nor is it about control. This is about love. The holy apostle is not putting wives down; he's raising the vision of husbands to a spiritual awareness of responsibility.

It's a daring equation, comparing the husband with Christ. Can a Christian who wears a cross at his neck and hangs a cross in his bedroom not comprehend the great, sacrificial love that Jesus Christ has demonstrated for His Church? There is not an atom of selfishness in it. Who reading the gospels can find somewhere or some word of the loving Lord that suggests, "What's in it for Me?" Show me a place that implies the Church doing something for Christ, rather than what Christ is doing for the Church.

St. Paul is speaking to all married men... Look up at Christ on the cross. Will you ever do that for her?... [L]ay down your life in her behalf. If it comes to one of you making a sacrifice for the sake of the family, step out smartly and be the one who offers his life for wife and family... The love of Christ for the Church is your measure of your own adoration of your wife. God forbid that you ever terrorize her, intimidate her or control her by temper tantrums or any of the more subtle mind control methods rampant in our culture.

You were commissioned by Christ in the sacred sacrament of marriage to love and honor her—she is ever your queen, and you must look for the crown still worn on her head, albeit invisibly.

Your love for her must be always pure and sacred. She is a temple of the Holy Spirit, and you must do nothing to defile that living temple. She is baptized in the blessed water of Jordan. It takes nothing from the romance or the love act to treat your wife as a being precious in the sight of the Lord. Any expression of love that degrades, humiliates or plain uses the partner is unworthy of your marriage. Any violation of your marital obligations to one another, adultery or lewdness, will invite the serpent of evil into your bed, cause you deceit and hypocrisy, and reduce you to shame and self-rejection.

True love will be constantly in search of ways to please your spouse, not yourself. Real affection is given through a glance, a touch, a card or flower. This woman is not your cook, your washerwoman or maid. She is far more than the one who cares for your children. If that's all she is to you, you are unworthy of calling yourself her husband.

If as you heard at the wedding, you "leave father and mother and cleave to your wife," she has become your very body. You are one flesh and blood with her. You can no more separate yourself from her that you would hack off your right arm. Despite our wicked society, you don't change partners; you live with the one that God gave you.

Most of all, your love is a reflection of the love of Christ for your spiritual family and the Church of which you all are a part. Your home is an extension of your parish, a chapel where love is the binding ingredient between your family members and with the loving Lord and yourself. ■


The Lord is My Shepherd by Dn. Mark Oleynik

The Scriptures are rich in references to the animal life and agriculture in the lands of the Bible. This is understandable since it was addressed to simple nomadic men and women who lived off the land. Obviously, much has changed over the centuries.

It is probably safe to say that most readers of the Bible do not have much, if any, knowledge of such things as goats, olive growing, yokes, and soil. Without any agricultural experience, it can be difficult to grasp (especially for children) scriptural truths if the meanings and lessons of the stories are missed.

To help provide some "farm" knowledge to our children, this year's Vacation Bible School (VBS) theme will focus on Jesus as the Good Shepherd. The students will study the "Shepherd's Psalm" (23) and learn about the traits and characteristics of sheep (they are fascinating). The objective of this VBS is to reveal why sheep are so prominent in the Bible (sheep are referenced over 500 times) and to learn what one of the most beloved psalms really means. It promises to be terrific week of scripture, songs, games, crafts—and even a tour to sheep farm!

VBS will be conducted June 13 through June 17 in the evenings (5:15-8:00 p.m.) and is open to children



who are entering Pre-K (i.e., one year before Kindergarten) through sixth grade in Fall 2016. Each day will begin with dinner. Parents are also encouraged to attend Daily Vespers and pray with their children on the Wednesday of VBS week, beginning at the special time at 5 p.m. Please visit our parish website (holytrinity-oca.org) to register your children online by June 5.
