## SNYDER COUNTY'S FIRST OUTREACH EVENT A HUGE SUCCESS!

On September 26, the mission in Snyder County had a unique opportunity to offer a witness to the increased presence of Orthodoxy in their community. As “vendors” at a street fair in downtown Selinsgrove, they passed out free bottled water and literature and answered questions about the Faith. Over 750 bottles of water were distributed and several inquirers visited the booth throughout the day.

This was an exciting day and the first official outreach event for the mission under its new name of **Chapel of the Holy Spirit** (which takes its name from Holy Trinity’s sister patronal feast). With a new identity, a blessing from Bishop MELCHISEDEK, and the arrival of Fr. Basil Biberdorf to assist in their efforts, CHS will soon benefit from a fuller cycle of services, including bimonthly Divine Liturgies. And the outreach continues to grow: four of the mission’s faithful will be illuminated at Holy Trinity this Saturday.

October will be another full month for the fledgling group. On Saturday, October 10, the faithful will set up another table at the annual Oktoberfest celebration in Beavertown. They will once again promote their main event, a presentation entitled “The Search for the New Testament Church” featuring Fr. Peter Gillquist, on Tuesday, October 20, 7pm, at Susquehanna University.

## PARISH ANNUAL MEETING

The challenge is always to see the holy in the mundane. The 19<sup>th</sup> century hymn writer John Keble put it well:

*If, on our daily course, our mind  
Be set to hallow all we find,  
New treasures still, of countless price,  
God will provide for sacrifice.*

*The trivial round, the common task,  
Will furnish all we ought to ask;  
Room to deny ourselves, a road  
To bring us daily nearer God.*

## ORTHODOX MISSION IN THE 21<sup>ST</sup> CENTURY

EDITOR'S NOTE: *The following series is excerpted from an article on missiology by Bishop HILARION (Alfeyev), a noted theologian, historian, composer, and author.*

### Part IV: Conclusion

The rediscovery of traditional Christian values is essential in the epoch which is marked by a deep demographic crisis, which in the course of the 21<sup>st</sup> century is likely to turn into an unprecedented catastrophe for many countries of the so-called "Western Civilization." More and more people are coming to the understanding that the roots of the current demographic crisis are spiritual rather than economic. It is loss of the traditional understanding of marriage and family, based on religious values that led to a radical transformation of ethical norms related to human sexuality in the second half of the 20<sup>th</sup> century...

The Orthodox Church can play a significant role in [a] religious awakening, which is perhaps the only thing that can save Western civilization from an irrecoverable collapse. On the threshold of the 21<sup>st</sup> century the Orthodox Church once again showed its capability to attract and inspire millions of people. A religious revival of unprecedented scale is going on in Russia, Ukraine, Belarus, Moldova and other countries of the former Soviet bloc.

Similar processes are underway in the Romanian, Serbian and Bulgarian Orthodox Churches, which also suffered under communist regimes, as well as in some other Local Orthodox Churches. Great missionaries carry out their apostolic work, such as Archbishop ANASTASIOS of Albania, who was able to practically re-create an Orthodox Church that had been reduced to zero by militant atheists. The Orthodox Church does not suffer from a "crisis of vocations," about which so many Christian Churches are constantly complaining. On the contrary, Orthodox theological seminaries, academies and faculties are full of young men and women eager to serve the Church, monasteries and convents are filled with monks and nuns.

As one of the few Christian Churches which are growing rather than declining, the Orthodox Church is a living proof of continuing relevance of that sort of Christianity which is based on traditional doctrinal and moral values. It also disproves a widespread opinion that we are living in a "post-Christian" epoch. I strongly believe that a worldwide revival of Christianity is ahead, and that the Orthodox Church will play a significant role in it.
