New Icons Installed in Nave and Altar

Worshippers at Holy Trinity were treated on August 1 to a beautiful array of new iconography, the work of the hands of renowned iconographer Dmitry Shkolnik and his assistant, Alexander. The icons that were written were the large icons of the Theotokos and the Savior; Ss. Stephen and Romanos for the two deacon's doors; the Annunciation and the Four Evangelists for the Royal Doors; as well as the Platytera—flanked by Seraphim—on the east sanctuary wall above the altar table.

The new icons will be blessed along with the consecration of our new altar on Saturday, October 16, followed by a celebratory banquet.

After completing the project, Mr. Shkolnik remarked that this was his best work to date. Preliminary plans are already being made to invite him back as early as next summer to finish the iconography in the altar, including one of Pentecost, and to install the image of “Christ Pantocrator” on the ceiling of the nave.

■ ORTHODOX SPIRITUALITY

On the Dormition by Fr. John Peck

The word “Dormition” simply means “falling asleep”—the biblical idiom for a believer’s death. The Dormition (Falling Asleep) of the Theotokos is one of the Great Feasts of the Orthodox Church, celebrated on August 15. This feast is called the Assumption in the Western churches, and commemorates the death, resurrection and glorification of the Virgin Mary, Christ’s mother. It proclaims that Mary has been “assumed” by God into the heavenly kingdom of Christ in the fullness of her spiritual and bodily existence.

The Tradition of the Church is that Mary died as all people die, not “voluntarily” as her Son, but by the necessity of her mortal human nature which is indivisibly bound up with the corruption of this world.

The Orthodox Church teaches that Mary is without personal sins. In the Gospel of the feast, however, in the liturgical services and in the Dormition icon, the Church proclaims as well that Mary truly needed to be saved by Christ as all human persons are saved from the trials, sufferings and death of this world; and that having truly died, she was raised up by her Son as the Mother of Life and participates already in the eternal life of paradise which is prepared and promised to all who “hear the word of God and keep it” (*Luke 11:27-28*).

The services of the feast repeat the main theme, that the Mother of Life has “passed over into the heavenly joy, into the divine gladness and unending delight” of the Kingdom of her Son (*Great Vespers verse*).

The Old Testament readings, as well as the Gospel readings for [Vespers, Matins,] and the

Divine Liturgy, are exactly the same as those for the feast of the Virgin’s nativity and her entrance into the Temple. Thus, at the Vigil we again hear Mary say: “My soul magnifies the Lord and my Spirit rejoices in God my Savior” (*Luke 1:47*).

At the Divine Liturgy we hear the letter to the Philippians where St. Paul speaks of the self-emptying of Christ who condescends to human servitude and ignoble death in order to be “highly exalted” by God His Father (*Philippians 2:5-11*). And once again we hear in the Gospel that Mary’s blessedness belongs to all who “hear the word of God and keep it” (*Luke 11:27-28*).

Thus, the feast of the Dormition of the Theotokos (Mother of God) is the celebration of the fact that all men are “highly exalted” in the blessedness of the victorious Christ, and that this high exaltation has already been accomplished in Mary. The feast of the Dormition is the sign, the guarantee, and the celebration that Mary’s fate is, the destiny of all those of “low estate” whose souls magnify the Lord, whose spirits rejoice in God the Savior, whose lives are totally dedicated to hearing and keeping the Word of God which is given to men in Mary’s child, the Savior and Redeemer of the world.

Finally it must be stressed that, in all of the feasts of the Virgin Mother of God in the Church, the Orthodox Christians celebrate facts of their own lives in Christ and the Holy Spirit. What happens to Mary happens to all who imitate her holy life of humility, obedience, and love.

With her all people will be “blessed” to be “more honorable than the cherubim and beyond

compare more glorious than the seraphim” if they follow her example. All will have Christ born in them by the Holy Spirit. All will become temples of the living God. All will share in the eternal life of His Kingdom who live the life that Mary lived.

In this sense everything that is praised and glorified in Mary is a sign of what is offered to all persons in the life of the Church. It is for this reason that Mary, with the divine child Jesus within her, is called in the Orthodox Tradition the Image of the Church. For the assembly of the saved is those in whom Christ dwells.

It is the final Great Feast on the Christian Calendar. Thus, as a symbol of all believers, the liturgical year begins with the Nativity (birth) of the Theotokos, and ends with her Dormition (falling asleep).

their own tickets, and, being responsible for them, and say, “It is mine.”

Finally, at any point, we must be able and prepared to show our tickets on demand (our names are also printed on most tickets) to prove that we are true travelers; in real life, every day our “ticket” is examined by someone. It is read at home, school, work, as well as in the street, and it seems as though our very faces are stamped with the name of the place to which we are travelling.

There are lots of fellow travelers who are on the same path to the city of the great King; they will

be helped along the road by the showing of our ticket. The boy who refused to tell a lie, or do a mean thing; the girl who is not afraid that others shall see her belief in Jesus Christ—these examples show very plainly of ones who possess a ticket and know their destination.

There is the story of the Prodigal son we read in Luke 15, “who took his journey,” who, because he did not know his real destination (*he had no ticket*), suffered great loss and had to start all over again. We need to make sure our children receive their tickets now and that they are marked plainly with the name of Him whom they will serve.

Abortion Doctor Kicked out of Pennsylvania

PHILADELPHIA – Steven Chase Brigham, a physician whose medical license has been revoked, relinquished, or temporarily suspended in five states, is now facing regulatory and tax troubles that could jeopardize his chain of 15 abortion clinics.

The Pennsylvania Department of Health last month ordered Brigham to permanently shut his four clinics in the state for repeatedly employing unlicensed caregivers... Brigham also has to deal with the IRS. In April, it placed \$234,536 in liens against him for failing to pay payroll taxes from
