efore the Chapel of the Holy Spirit's new temple could begin arising above Beavertown's skyline, the surrounding ground had to prepared and the foundation laid. Now that the building itself is nearing completion—with occupancy expected this month—Chapel faithful continue to do their part in laying a more important foundation, witnessing the Orthodox Faith in their community.

Since the Chapel began holding services regularly six years ago, we have prayed at every Liturgy "that our Lord would look upon us and the faithful of the Chapel of the Holy Spirit, preparing the soil of our hearts so that His seed may grow and produce fruit in abundance, both in us and in Synder community."

Cooperating with God in this vision to see sown seed take root, the Chapel handed out thousands of materials last month, from pens and bottles of water, to pamphlets and Study Bibles at the Beaver Fair and the Selinsgrove Street Festival. This month, the Chapel will sponsor another Family Fun Night on Sunday, October 18 from 5 to 7 p.m., opening up the Middlecreek Area Community Center (MACC) for residents to enjoy. They will also witness Christ's love to passersby at the Beaver Springs Oktoberfest taking place there at the MACC the day before.

As the Chapel prepares to open the doors of its temple to the community, continue to pray that God will build upon the good heart-soil that has been tilled. ■

October: The Best is Yet to Come

The opening of Trinity House has been postponed for a few weeks because of a number of issues: permits, finishes, and furnishings. Please bear with us. Life's delays teach us patience, if we are willing. We'll enjoy things that much more upon completion. Stay tuned.

Nevertheless, we will welcome His Eminence Archbishop Melchisedek to the parish for his annual visitation October 1-4. He will take the opportunity to visit with the Orthodox Christian Fellowship, tour the Chapel and Trinity House, and celebrate the Divine Liturgy with us on Sunday.

In other news, Inquirer's Class will continue every Sunday in October at 6:30 p.m. in the Parish Hall, while the Adult Study group meets there on Tuesdays at 7 p.m. The Women's Book Study meets every other Thursday at 10 a.m. at the Rectory, 562 Lanceshire Lane. Sunday School has commenced once again with a record potential enrollment of 45 students. Many thanks to Deacon Mark and all the Sunday School teachers for their time, their dedication, and especially their prayers on behalf of our children: "Train up a child in the way he should go, and he will not depart from it when he is old" (Proverbs 22:6).

In addition to the commemoration of St. Demetrius of Thessaloniki on October 26, the Saturday preceding the feast is always a Soul Saturday, a time to remember the departed in Christ. I recently ran across a quote from Fr. Dr. Stelios Muksuris' talk at the 2013 International Conference on Liturgical Renewal in Boston and wanted to share it, especially because of all the superstitious practices associated with the end of October in our culture:

Those fallen asleep, like the saints who are glorified, remain full members of the sacramental Church and so continue to offer the worship due to God together with the living, albeit in a different phase of their existence. This unity was first conveyed by the ancient catacombs where Christians gathered for the Eucharist and later on up to our own day, by the cemeteries that surround local parish churches.

Make sure you commemorate your departed loved ones by leaving their names on the commemoration slips in the narthex when attending Divine Liturgy on St. Demetrius Soul Saturday, October 24, at 9 a.m. (The non-Orthodox should be clearly marked with an asterisk [*].)

Finally, note that the annual meeting will be held on Sunday, November 8, following the Divine Liturgy. Nominations are currently being accepted for the Council offices of Treasurer, Secretary, and Building Chair. Since no motions may be made from the floor, please submit any proposed motions to the Council by its October meeting for consideration.

Analysis: Proliferation of Pornography a Crisis for the Church, Culture

[In a recent study,] Barna found that 64 percent of American men and 20 percent of women view pornography at least monthly. And for Christian men, that number is 55 percent. [Fifteen] years ago, only one out of every three men had ever gone to a pornography site, but now nearly one-third of men under 30 do so on a daily basis. And if you think it can't get worse, the survey found that 18 percent of men believe they may be addicted to pornography. That's more than 20 million men in deep trouble...

One of the first things to realize is that rampant pornography use can't be isolated from its larger cultural context. So many of our social ills stem from the fact that society is losing or abandoning the ability to see people as beings made in the image of God. With crime, victims are treated as obstacles to overcome or things to exploit. Abortion sees people as disposable because he or she is inconvenient. Pornography treats people as objects in service of self-gratification. We've become this "use or be used" society.

And so, if we are to reclaim the sacred dignity of every human person amidst this brutish culture, we must turn inward—we can no longer stand in the front of the church patting ourselves on the back for not being like those sexual sinners out there. Instead, together we can lower our face before God and say, "Have mercy on me, a sinner..."

[B]y praying and seeking spiritual renewal in our Church, we have an incredible opportunity to reach out with the Good News of Jesus Christ to the hidden, the lost, and the ashamed. And right now, there are plenty of folks—millions even—waiting along the highways and byways for an invitation to the wedding feast of the Lamb. And invite them we must.

■ ORTHODOX SPIRITUALITY

Five Indicators of an Evil Heart by Leslie Vernick

One of the reasons we don't "see" evil is because we find it so difficult to believe that evil individuals actually exist. We can't imagine someone deceiving us with no conscience, hurting others with no remorse, spinning outrageous fabrications to ruin someone's reputation, or pretending he or she is spiritually committed yet has no fear of God before his or her eyes.

The Bible clearly tells us that among God's people there are wolves that wear sheep's clothing. It's true that every human heart is inclined toward sin, and that includes evil. We all miss God's mark of moral perfection. However, most ordinary sinners do not happily indulge evil urges, nor do we feel good about having them. We feel ashamed and guilty, rightly so. These things are not true of the evil heart.

Below are five indicators that you may be dealing with an evil heart rather than an ordinary sinful [one] ...

- > Evil hearts are experts at creating confusion and contention. They twist the facts, mislead, lie, avoid taking responsibility, deny reality, make up stories, and withhold information.
- > Evil hearts are experts at fooling others with their smooth speech and flattering words. But if you look at the fruit of their lives or the follow through of their words, you will find no real evidence of godly growth or change. It's all smoke and mirrors.
- > Evil hearts crave and demand control, and their highest authority is their own self-reference. They reject feedback, real accountability, and make up their own rules to live by. They use Scripture to their own advantage but ignore and reject passages that might require self-correction and repentance.
- > Evil hearts play on the sympathies of good-willed people, often trumping the grace card. They demand mercy but give none themselves. They demand warmth, forgiveness, and intimacy from those they have

harmed with no empathy for the pain they have caused and no real intention of making amends or working hard to rebuild broken trust.

Evil hearts have no conscience, no remorse.

They do not struggle against sin or evil—they delight in it—all the while masquerading as someone of noble character...the longer you try to reason with them or show mercy towards them, the more you, as the Christian counselor, will become a pawn in his or her game.

They want you to believe that:

- Their horrible actions should have no serious or painful consequences... They believe grace means they are immediately granted immunity from the relational fallout of their serious sin. They believe forgiveness entitles them to full reconciliation and will pressure you and their victim to comply... When someone is truly sorry for the pain they have caused, he or she is eager to make amends to those they have harmed by their sin (see Zacchaeus' response when he repented of his greed in Luke 19)...
- If [they] talk like a [Christian they are], even if [their] actions don't line up with [their] talk.

 Remember, Satan masquerades as an angel of light.

 He knows more true doctrine than you or I will ever know, but his heart is wicked. Why? Because although he knows the truth, he does not believe it or live it.

 The Bible has some strong words for those whose actions do not match their talk. St. John the Baptist said it best when he admonished the religious leaders, "Prove by the way you live that you have repented of your sins and turned to God" (Luke 3:8)...

When you confront evil, chances are good that the evil heart will [depart from] you because the darkness hates the light... But that outcome is far better than allowing the evil heart to believe you are on his or her side, or that "he's not that bad" or "that he's really sorry" or "that he's changing" when, in fact, he is not.

Our church has partnered with Housing Transitions, a non-profit organization that provides housing, food, clothes and various other services to the people in need in Centre County. Every second Tuesday of the month individuals or families from our church visit the residents (217 E. Nittany Avenue, State College), cook and eat dinner with them.
