O *Vic*torious <u>Leader of triumphant hosts</u>, we, *thy* servants, de<u>liv</u>ered from <u>ev</u>il, sing our grateful thanks to thee, O Theo<u>to</u>kos. As thou *dost* pos<u>sess</u> in<u>vin</u>cible might, set us free from every ca<u>la</u>mity, // so *that* we may <u>sing</u>: Re<u>joice</u>, O un<u>wed</u>ded Bride.
