# Deliver Us from the Evil One



Current and past singers from Holy Trinity and the Chapel came together to sing at the "25 Years of Ministry" Celebration, which took place in October. Beginning this month, the Choir will make a simple, yet profound, change when singing the "Our Father" at Liturgy.

FEW WEEKS BACK, when I preached on "Halloween, the Devil, and the Synagogue ► Shooting," I noted that one of our biggest problems in society is that we don't take the Devil and, consequently, Evil seriously in our society. Thus, whenever a tremendous, obviously-evil event takes place—like the synagogue shooting in Pittsburgh we are often tongue-tied when called to speak about such a horror. We've either sanitized or made light of the Devil so that we don't know what or how to converse about such an event.

Hatred, mental illness, and a host of other issues are involved. Yet, as Orthodox Christians, we have to come to terms that Evil doesn't simply mean "bad" but that there is an Evil One who is still prowling over the face of the earth and seeking to devour. The Evil One is not a figure of speech, but a spiritual reality. If we fail to recognize this obstacle in our own lives, we won't be able to confront the Enemy on our turf.

### **Archbishop Returns to** Meet with Leadership, OCF, and the Chapel

Although here less than eight weeks ago for the "25 Years of Ministry" Celebration, our hierarch, His Eminence Archbishop Melchisedek of Pittsburgh, returned late last month to reside in the parish. Over the course of five days, His Eminence met with the Transition Team and Parish Council to brief them on the search for a new rector, joined Penn State students at their weekly Orthodox Christian Fellowship meeting, visited the Chapel of the Holy Spirit for Great Vespers; and celebrated the Hierarchical Divine Liturgy at Holy Trinity. Because the search for a rector is ongoing, His Eminence did not dismiss the Transition Team as expected; rather, the group was tasked with a new charge: create a series of interview questions that will be submitted to each rector candidate prior to assignment. The team will gather in an open meeting at Trinity House on Thursday, December 13 at 7 p.m. ■

### Deliver Us from the Evil One (continued from page 1)

Until society learns that Evil is much more than a series of "bad choices"—that we wrestle not (merely) against flesh and blood but against spiritual wickedness in high places—we won't have the spiritual insight to understand what is happening around us or know how to respond when it manifests itself.

Hence, I mentioned in my sermon that day that the "deliver us from evil" petition in the Our Father was rather weak and off base. Scripture itself uses the definite article, "the" Evil (one):  $\tau o \tilde{v} = \pi o v \eta \rho o \tilde{v}$ . Recognizing this, the Orthodox Church in America's latest edition of the *Hieratikon* (Priest's Service Book) officially endorsed this translation so it would only be a matter of time until we brought our liturgical practice up to date here in the parish. (Actually, the cantors have been doing this for a number of years, and our Chapel of the Holy Spirit has been singing "Evil One" for the last 5-6 years.) It won't be strange to our ears but it will take a little time for us in State College to learn to sing it together with the choir.

So, here it is: beginning Sunday, December 9, the choir will sing "deliver us from the Evil One" at the

conclusion of the Our Father. And please, as you pray the Our Father throughout the day, meditate on the difference between a vague concept of "Evil" and the more dynamic "Evil One" against whom our Lord directs our attention.

# Raising Kids Shows Us We Need Christ

If you're looking for a gauge to measure how un-Christlike you are, try raising kids. At least that works pretty well for me. In *The Four Loves*, C.S. Lewis speaks of "the bad manners of parents to children." Ahem. Guilty...

When preaching through Paul's marriage advice, priests often make the comment that Paul has to instruct husbands to love and wives to respect because if they're prone to going off the rails, it'll be in those directions: men lacking kindness and wives losing respect.

Apply the same thinking to Paul's instruction to fathers. Twice he says, "Fathers, do not provoke your children." In his letter to the Colossians he adds, "lest they become discouraged" (3:21), and he warns the Ephesians about provoking children "to anger" (6:4). When I go wrong with my boys, that's exactly the direction I head: I drive them to discouragement and frustration... As dads, [we're] prone to exasperating [our] kids. Don't.

I have been reading Elder Porphyrios' advice about parenting in the book *Wounded by Love*. It slays me. "[P]arents need to devote themselves to the love of God," he says. "They need to become saints in relation to their children through their mildness, patience, and love. They need to make a new start every day, with a fresh outlook, renewed enthusiasm and love for their children."

Do I really do that—or do I build a file on my children, one that tallies sins more than it forgives them? Children's behavior, says the elder, "is not improved by reprimands, disciplining, or strictness. If the parents do not pursue a life of holiness and if they don't engage in spiritual struggle, they make great mistakes and transmit the faults they have within them."

A parent must employ "disciplinary measures," admits Porphyrios but adds, "Above all, you need to pray." And it's in reading words like these that I realize how much grace I truly need.

There's a prayer in the Church for parents. "O Righteous Judge," it says, "who punishes children for the sins of their parents, punish not my children for my sins, but sprinkle them with the dew of Thy grace..."

I can correct my son all day, but if it's coming from a hard heart, I will only close his. I will, as the apostle warned, drive him to discouragement—or worse. To pray the prayer above is to ask God for mercy in their lives, to relieve the ill effects of my own sins, and instead to "sprinkle them with the dew of [God's] grace." As we say in the litany, "Grant this, O Lord."
