Parish Faithfully Looks to 2020



Father Mark Meholick, Dean of the Eastern Deanery of the Archdiocese of Western Pennsylvania, presides over the 2019 Parish Annual Meeting in lieu of an assigned rector. Though not without some technical difficulty, Fr. David Smith, Interim Priest and *Priest-in-Charge of the Chapel of the Holy Spirit, joined with Chapel faithful from Beavertown for the first time via teleconference.*

FFIRMING GROWTH in both attendance and giving this year despite being between rectors, members of Holy Trinity and the Chapel of the Holy Spirit passed a modest growth budget for next year (2.5 percent year-over-year). The nearly \$350,000 combined 2020 Budget maintains the increase passed in 2019 for the new rector's compensation package and increases the parish's outreach and fellowship funding by 27%. This expansion reflects the parish's ongoing support of the Chapel, which has taken on added responsibility for its portion of the Archdiocesan assessment and half of the monthly payment for a new mortgage to fund a planned altar addition. "The continued outpouring of your prayers and your gifts for the ministry and mission of the Church—your answer to the Lord's call—sustains us in this time and helps us to continue to 'build up the Church beyond our parish," said Justin Houser, Council President. "It is impossible to state in a few words how truly special and 'trend-breaking' your support has been.

THE MONTHLY NEWSLETTER OF HOLY

Our parish is strong as it continues to serve Christ in Central Pennsylvania." In their reports, treasurer Michael Stickles announced a 11% increase in liquid assets in 2019 vs. 2018 and Interim Priest Fr. David Smith highlighted the return of several priest-led foundational ministries including Orthodoxy 2.0 and the Adult Study Group. For more on the meeting, visit *holytrinity-oca.org*. ■

Advice on Abstinence this Advent

Excessive consumption of information is the scourge of modern era, and that is why there isn't anything about it in the rules of fast. This is not to say that consuming too much information has a lesser impact on our souls than overeating.

A Christian man shared how he had decided to refrain from watching TV for a month. In spite of his not having been too much of a TV fan previously, he felt so much pressure to switch on the TV that he likened it to drug addiction: he would even wake up in the middle of the night to watch TV secretly. Honestly, what do you personally crave more: boiled food or online entertainment? (I'm not speaking of work-related computer use. I'm speaking of using gadgets for entertainment, that is, for useless chatting and satisfying one's curiosity). Needless to say, a TV or a tablet is nothing but a tool, which can be a source of either good or bad knowledge. Reasonable amount of information is as important as quality of that information. Here is some advice:

Stop using gadgets and TV for the duration of the fast and turn to spiritually edifying books. It will help you realize how much we rely on mass media.

➤ At least, stop following the news. If that sounds impossible, try to recall the hottest topics in the news from three days ago. Are you sure you really can't live without that information vapor?

If you are afraid that you'll miss something really important, don't worry: people around you will never give you a chance not to learn about the important event that happened while you were unplugged.

Be Filled with Joy this Nativity Season

As in years past, there are several ways for you and your family to prepare for the Birth of our Redeemer this month—quietly, prayerfully, and intentionally redeeming time:

- ➤ Children are especially encouraged to bring their parents to Great Vespers on Wednesday, December 5 at the new Vespers time of 6 p.m. The customary evlogia from St. Nicholas will be distributed.
- ➤ The Sunday School will spread the news of Christ's birth by caroling in the Holmes-Foster neighborhood and by performing their annual Nativity play. For more details, see the next page.
- ➤ Vespers in preparation for the Nativity begin December 21 and continue daily through the 24th. Confessions will be heard after Sunday's Vespers and before and after Monday's Vespers. The Nativity Fast is one of the four periods during the church year when frequent communicants are expected to confess.
- ➤ Our St. Nicholas Tree in the narthex enables the disadvantaged in our community to receive gifts through Matthew 25's partnership with Strawberry Fields. Please take a tag if you are able. Each tag has the child's age, sex, and wish. Return gifts to the narthex or Trinity House (open daily) by Sunday, December 22 to spread Christ's love to the poor.

The Season's Four Levels of Mission

Since the beginning of the November the parish has been reflecting on four levels of missionary activity—to oneself, to one's family, to one's community, and to the world. Evidences of each abound this season: Ascetical disciplines of fasting and almsgiving during the forty days preceding the Nativity of the Lord profit the soul; children raised \$4,000 for summer camp at a Mexicanthemed dinner in November; *Matthew 25* conducts drives to support those in need in our community—most recently, through its Thanksgiving and St. Nicholas Tree appeals (see next column and page 2, respectively); and the Sunday School is supplementing the Orthodox Church's outreach to Kenya (see page 3). May God richly bless you and your generosity as you invite Christ within and share Him with those around you.

Miraculous St. Anna Icon to Visit Archdiocese this Month

WAYMART, PA — Originally gifted from the Mount of Olives Convent outside of Jerusalem and enshrined in a parish in Philadelphia, an icon of St. Anna containing a relic of the grandmother of Christ began to miraculously stream myrrh in 2014 and continued to do so for over five years. The icon is now enshrined at St. Tikhon's Monastery here and has become widely known as a help for those struggling to conceive children, and in aiding the healing of those suffering from cancer.

While the icon no longer weeps myrrh, it continues to exude a heavenly, sweet fragrance, as a testimony to its miraculous quality. Many miracles and graces continue to come from this holy icon, consoling all those who seek St. Anna's intercession. The icon will be accompanied by Fr. Sergius, Abbot of St. Tikhon's Monastery, on a trip to the Archdiocese of Western Pennsylvania. On December 6 at 6:30 p.m., it will be in St. Nicholas Church in Donora; at St. John's in Canonsburg on December 7 at 10 a.m.; and at the Cathedral in Allison Park for the Vespers and Liturgy of December 7-8. Presentations, homilies, and services take place at each visitation. All are welcome.
