Featured Saint: Saint Peter the Tax Collector



Saint Peter, the former tax collector, is commemorated every year on September 22nd. Saint Peter was the chief tax collector in Africa for Emperor Justinian, and he was known as cruel and merciless. One day, after throwing a piece of bread to a beggar, he had a dream where the good deeds of his life were weighed against his evil deeds. In the

dream, the only good deed he ever committed was giving bread to the beggar. Saint Peter repented and began giving food, money, and clothes to needy people. Eventually, Saint Peter sold himself into slavery and ordered his servant to distribute the money from the sale to the poor. One day, when Saint Peter's master discovered the luxurious background of his slave, Saint Peter ran away. As he was leaving the city, he performed a miracle: he ordered a deaf and mute gatekeeper to open the city gates in the name of Jesus Christ, and the gatekeeper obliged, gaining the ability to speak and hear. Saint Peter went into hiding and remained hidden until he died.

Featured Icon: Kursk Icon



The Kursk Root Icon of the Mother of God dates back to the 13th century and is one of the oldest icons within the Russian Orthodox Church and it is known as a miracle icon. In 1259, a hunter saw the icon on a root face downwards, and once the hunter lifted the icon a spring of pure water surged up from where the icon was resting and the water became known for its miraculous healing

properties. The day this occurred September 8th

became the icon's annual feast day. Later the hunter rebuilt a small chapel and placed the holy icon within it. People came to the icon to pray about their sorrows and needs and the Mother of God healed and helped all of those who came to her icon.

Later the icon was transferred to Rylsk and placed in a new church but the icon did not remain there for long. It disappeared and returned to the place where it had first appeared and no matter how many times the inhabitants of Rylsk took it back to their city, the icon always miraculously returned to its former place, which is now on the grounds of the Kursk Root Hermitage. Many miracles are associated with this icon and it is even linked to many prosperous and victorious events within Russian history. Several copies of the icon have been made, which have also been associated with miracles.

What is the Feast of the Conception of John the Baptist?

On September 23rd we celebrate the miracle that was the conception of John the Baptist. He was born of a righteous village priest Zachariah and his wife Elizabeth (both of whom would later become saints). Unfortunately, the couple remained childless into their old age. Zachariah prayed unceasingly to God for a child, and one day while serving in the temple sanctuary the Angel Gabriel appeared to him and informed him that his wife would bear him a child, which he would name John. Because Zachariah did not initially believe Gabriel's words, he was forced to remain silent until the day of the birth of his son, John.

We have gathered here in front of the Saint Nicholas Church and National Shrine, which is once again under construction, in order to offer unto our Heavenly Father - the names, the souls, and the memories of those who perished nineteen years ago, this very day. ... We will never forget; we will never allow the world to forget. The rebuilt Saint Nicholas Church will be an everlasting memorial to their lives. It will also be both a spiritual home and a spiritual hospital for you, the survivors, to come and find healing and fellowship."
