SACRAMENTAL RIGORISM ADULT ED

This Wednesday, we welcome back Fr. Isaac Danevicius from St. George Antiochian Orthodox Church in Altoona. He will be speaking on a series of low-level scandals that have troubled the Church in the past few decades. These scandals have centered around the insistence by some that certain confessing, communing Orthodox Christians (including priests and bishops) need to be baptized in order to be in right standing with God. This insistence on the re-baptism of Orthodox Chrisitians is often referred to as "sacramental rigorism" by its detractors. But where did this movement come from? How should we interpret it? And what theological and pastoral problems might it present to the Church? Join us as Fr. Isaac leads us in an exploration of this topic!
